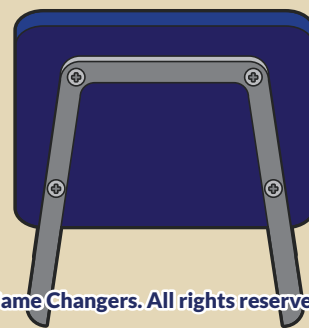
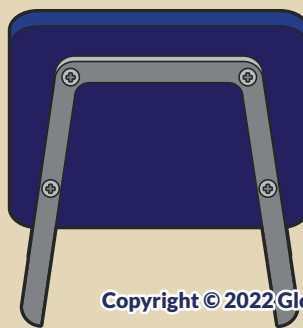
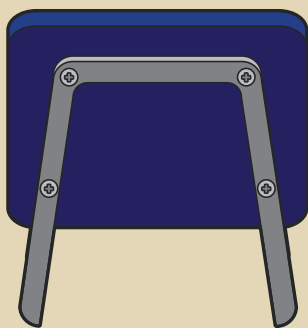
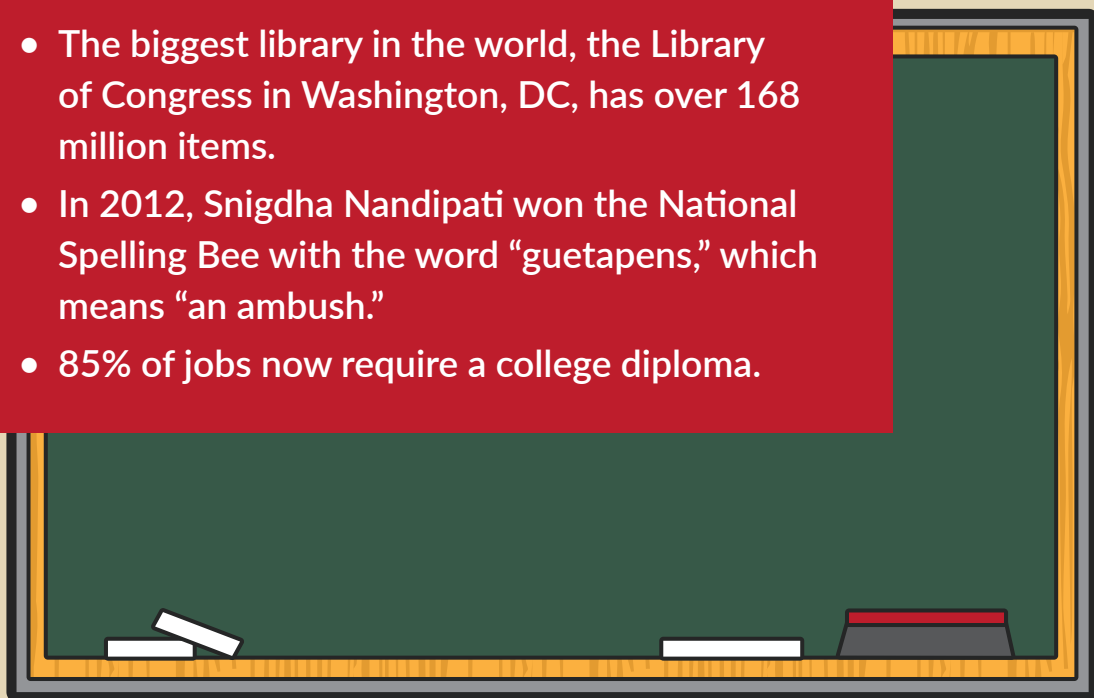
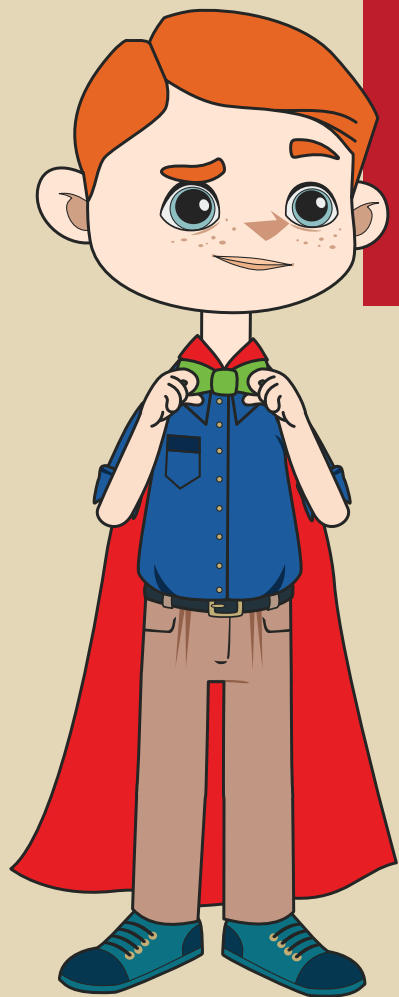


EDUCATION BADGE

LUA OLIVEIRA

REAL-LIFE EDUCATION SUPERHERO

Lua, a 12-year-old girl from Brazil, was changed forever when she witnessed a mother telling her child that they couldn't afford to purchase a book at a local book fair.

Deciding she had to do something, Lua created a video to request people send books to start a community library. At first she received 18,000 books, and now receives over 1,500 books a week. She hopes to send these books to libraries around her home country of Brazil in order to introduce thousands of kids to the wonders of reading.

"I love coming here," she said about the library. "I come almost every day."

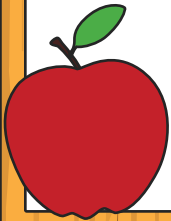

LET'S GET ORGANIZED

Staying organized is important when learning, as it helps you to remember what work you need to do and where your supplies are, but did you know your teacher has to be organized too?

Think about your classroom. What does your teacher use to keep your classroom neat and create a space ready for you to learn? They might use bookshelves, arrange your desks in certain ways, create a comfy, quiet reading corner, or use different containers to hold supplies.

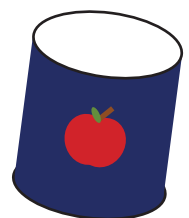
Today you are going to help your teacher keep their desk clean, so they can keep track of their pens and pencils by making a Homemade Pencil Holder.

MATERIALS

- Clean food can
- Paper
- Markers
- Glue
- Scissors
- Various art supplies (Optional)
- Popsicle sticks (Optional)

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Thoroughly clean the can with soap and water, inside and out, and remove the food label, then dry the can off.
2. Cut a strip of paper to the height of the can.
3. Wrap the paper around the can and cut off any extra so that the paper just overlaps a little bit.
4. If you are using popsicle sticks, glue the sticks side by side to cover the whole strip of paper. If you aren't using popsicle sticks, lay the paper flat and draw on it.
5. Decorate the popsicle sticks.
6. Flip the paper over and put glue on the back.
7. Wrap the paper smoothly around the can.
8. Press on the outside to make sure it sticks to the can.
9. Let it dry and deliver your pencil holder to your teacher.

GGC SUPERHERO KITCHEN

It's always a good idea to learn some basic skills to build on as you grow. And a good chocolate chip cookie recipe is a standard in every cook's kitchen! Give this one a try, share with family and friends, and see what they think.



CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIES

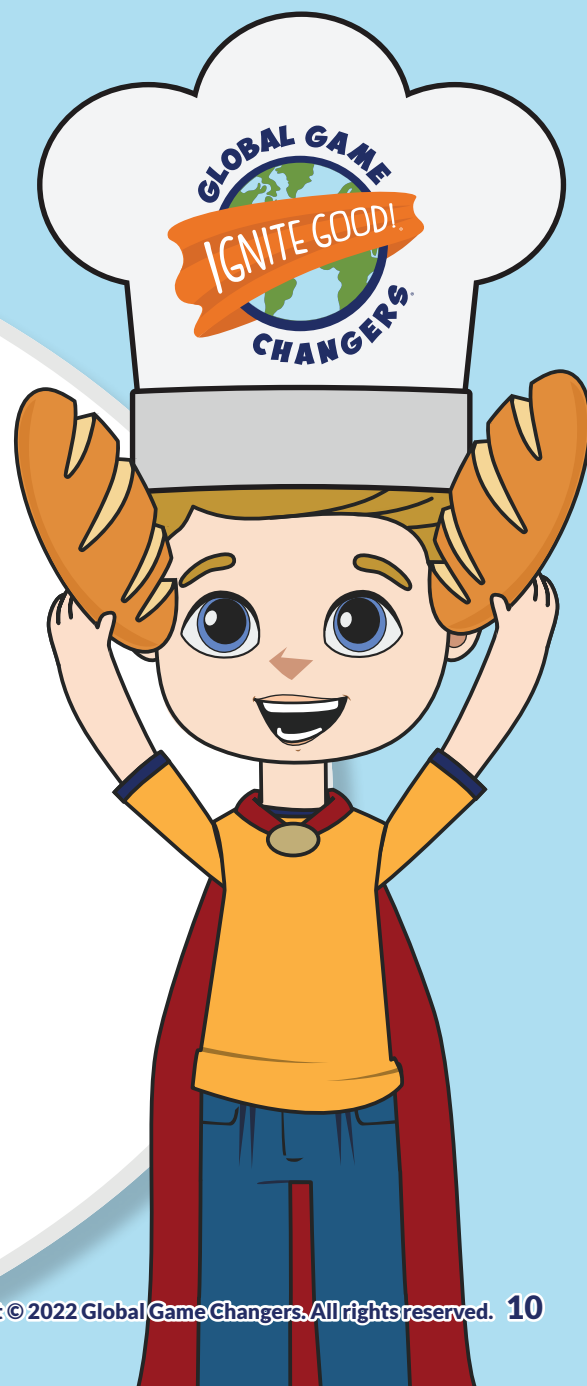
INGREDIENTS:

• ½ cup unsalted butter, melted (ask a grown-up for help) • 1/3 cup granulated sugar • ½ cup packed light brown sugar • 1 large egg • 1 teaspoon (5ml) vanilla extract • ½ teaspoon baking soda • ½ teaspoon salt • 1 ½ cups all-purpose flour • 1 ½ cups chocolate chips (semi-sweet or milk)

DIRECTIONS:

Note: This dough requires chilling

1. Place melted butter in a large bowl. Add granulated and brown sugars and mix on low speed until the mixture is smooth. Mix in egg and vanilla extract and mix on medium speed until combined.
2. Mix in baking soda and salt, then slowly mix in flour and mix just until the batter is smooth and comes together. Be sure to scrape the sides of the bowl during mixing. Slowly mix in chocolate chips.
3. Line a cookie sheet with a silicone baking mat or parchment paper. Scoop 2 tablespoon balls of dough onto the cookie sheet. Spacing doesn't matter because you will be chilling the dough. Cover with plastic wrap and chill for at least 2 hours
4. With a grown-up's help, preheat oven to 350°F. Line a second cookie sheet with parchment paper or a silicone baking mat.
5. Remove the chilled cookie dough balls from the refrigerator and space them 2-inches apart on the cookie sheets. Bake (2 tablespoon sized cookies) for 11-15 minutes, or until the edges are a light golden and the tops are no longer glossy. Let cool on the cookie sheets at least 10 minutes before removing.



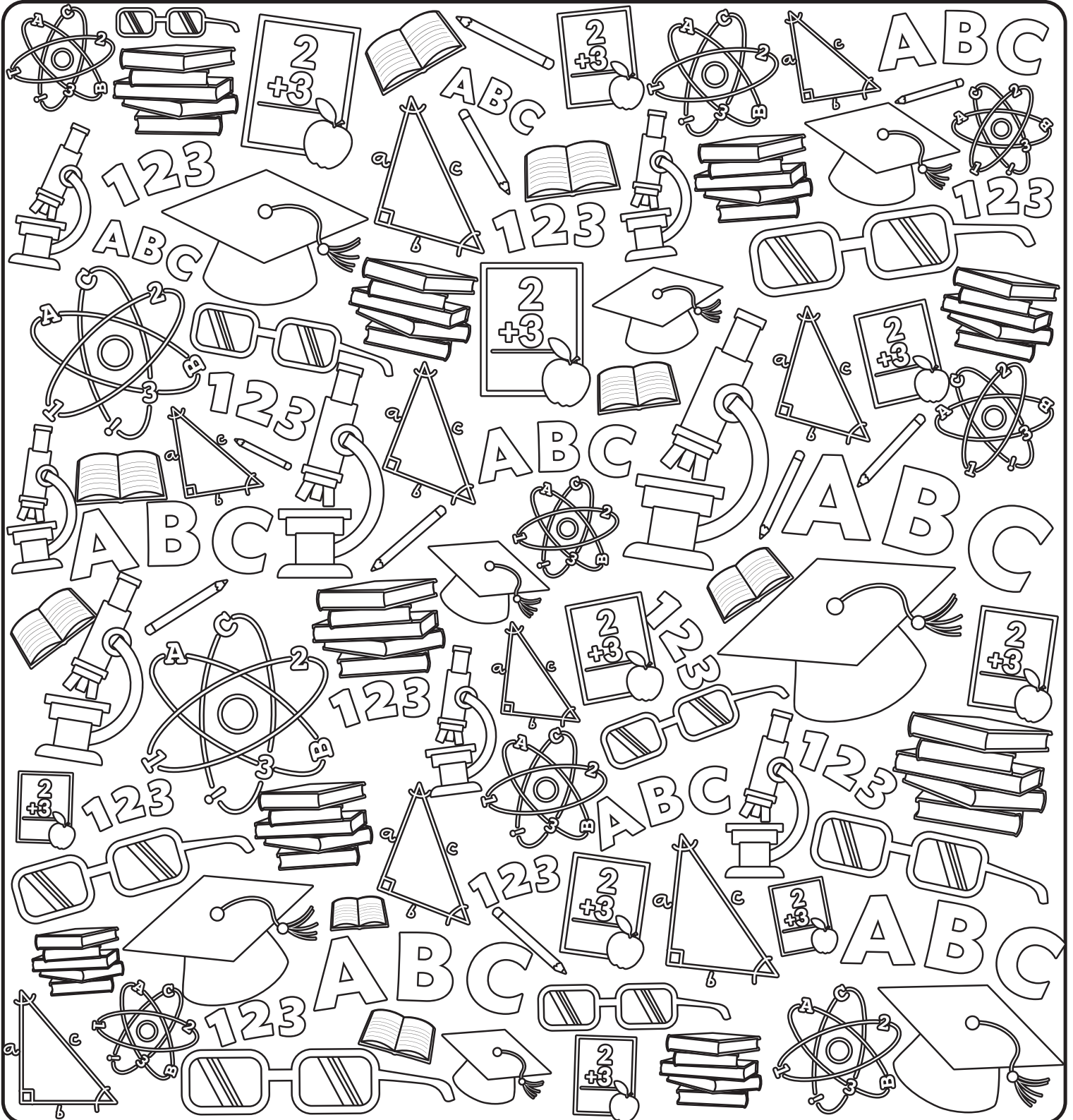
